

History

- New Life Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association, originally called the New Life Mutual Aid Club, was formed in 1959 and registered with the authorities in 1961.
- It was run by a group of people with mental illness, and was reorganized and changed its name in 1965.



- Established in 1968
- The first and the only sheltered workshop in Hong Kong using agriculture and horticulture as rehabilitation media for people with mental illness and/or mental handicap
- In the 70s, started as a self-financed project. Training included farming, swine & pigeon rearing and brick production

•

- In the 80s, the farm was transformed into a sheltered workshop
- In the early 90s, the farm underwent the 1st phase of reconstruction. Training in vegetables processing and delivery were added, while swine & pigeon rearing were stopped
- No. of service users increased to 80



- In late 90s, the farm underwent the 2nd phase of reconstruction:
 - work stations were constructed
 - no. of service users increased to 140
 - organic farming method was employed







 Organic Certifications were obtained from the Hong Kong Organic Resource Centre in Aug 2004 and the Hong Kong organic Certification Centre in Sept 2004 respectively





1. Retailing: from Kin Sang Vegetable Stall to HLSS

 1993 operated a vegetable stall in a public housing estate

 An approach combining rehabilitation service and business approach to create opportunity for vocational training



 2004 operated the 1st Healthy Living Specialty Shop at West Rail Stations to promote healthy eating style to general public



2. Ecotourism

• In 2004, funding applied from 'Enhancing Employment of People with Disabilities through Small Enterprise' to start a social enterprise named 'Eco-tourism'





2. Eco-tourism

- Aim to enhance public's awareness to mental health, environmental protection and rehabilitation services
- To develop eco-tourism (social enterprise) to let public to participate in organic farming activities
- To create opportunity in vocational training and employment for service users
- To promote social integration between service users and general public



Benefits for the Needy

- Service users benefit from participating in agricultural and horticultural activities
- Public benefit from participating in organic farming activities and healthy lifestyle and diet



Studies (1)

- An Exploratory Study on the Relationship between Agricultural and Horticultural Approach in Vocational Rehabilitation and Well-being of People with Psychiatric Disability in New Life Farm
- Conducted by Occupational Therapist and social worker in 2006



Objectives

- 1. To study the subjective well-being of people with mental illness receiving agricultural and horticultural rehabilitation in New Life Farm
- 2. To explore factors contributing to objective 1



Method

Study period:
10/7/2006 -18/8/2006

Target:

43 service users (37 male, 6 female) receiving agricultural and horticultural rehabilitation in New Life Farm diagnosed with mental illness and/or mental handicap
